Conservation Agent: Submitted by Jane Varkonda:

The Commission held one public meeting in November.

November 18, 2020: Sullivan - driveway and retaining wall; Jobs Neck Farm Trust – construct accessory office building; Outer Banks Nominee Trust – construct new barn; Mason – licensing and maintenance of a seasonal pier and walkway; Rankow – three new pilings and landing. -Update on Katama Farm Stewardship Committee.

Access to the office on a more regular basis has allowed for more timely responses to the public at large, and the large volume of paperwork required when properties in the Commission's jurisdiction sell and change ownership. The Agent has been running the Katama Farm Stewardship Committee meetings and obtaining and processing all the information and documents for the search for new agricultural and educational tenants. The Committee advertised for Expressions of Interest for use of Katama farm. The agent and the Woods Hole group held the public session meeting and town department meetings to review the findings of the Climate Change Vulnerability Assessment and Adaptation Planning for town infrastructure. Site plan surveys were initiated for



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the project to move the Left Fork bath house and restore dunes in the immediate vicinity. The design and permitting phase of the project has been funded (75%) by a grant from the Mass Office of Coastal Management.

Council on Aging: Submitted by Lyndsay Famariss:

The ECOA staff collaborated with other agencies (MV Hospital, Edgartown Police Department, Elder Services, Greater Boston Food Bank and the Island Grown Initiative to name a few) this month to try to meet the food needs of the town's older adults.

The staff switched to a fully remote work model due to rising COVID numbers in Dukes County. The ECOA staff expanded their calls and emails to older residents and continued to deliver approximately 200 meals a week.

The ECOA was fortunate to receive a CARES grant through Elder Services of Cape Cod and the Islands that provided two iPads and a wifi hotspot for our outreach workers to use. The hope is that these iPads will allow our staff to meet with clients, when appropriate, outside and use them to access online resources as needed. In the future, we hope that we can use these in clients' homes and help them to learn how to use this technology to participate in online programming, telemedicine, and social connections with friends and family.

Planning Board: Submitted by Doug Finn:

The Planning Board met twice this month, on November 10 (November 3 meeting rescheduled due to National Election) and November 17. The Board scheduled meetings for December 1, December 8 and December 15. All meetings continue to be conducted through remote participation, in accordance with the Governor's order of March 10, 2020, and Chapter 53 of the Acts of 2020.

Board Business for November:

- DEFINITIVE SUBDIVISION (R-60) Site visit to the Southridge Lane subdivision site; final 'release of lots'. APPROVED. Chapps, Edgartown-West Tisbury Road (27-249.1, 27-249.2)
- SPECIAL PERMIT (COASTAL DISTRICT) Construction of a pool in the inland zone of the coastal district. (Chiu, 26 Orr Lane (20B-76.3)
- SPECIAL PERMIT (B-II DISTRICT) Convert an existing dwelling to a Transient Residential Facility (an Inn). ONGOING. Stoney Brook LLC, Upper Main Street (20C-27)
- DE MINIMIS (Coastal District) Request to exceed height for small portion of by-right dwelling that encroaches into the Inland Zone of the Coastal District. Rosbeck, Blue Heron Way (12-9, 12-10, 12-11)
- DE MINIMIS (Coastal District) Request for a modification to the garage layout, and removal of a condition related thereto. APPROVED. Catalina Island Nominee Trust, Ocean View Avenue (29-149)



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- ANR Lot line adjustment, creating two non-conforming parcels for transfer to direct abutters. No new building lots created. ENDORSED. Diorio, Louis Field Road (21-156.2)
- ROAD NAME ASSIGNMENT (R-120) Request to name a private road. A properly constructed subdivision way, approved in 2003, but never named. Applicant has approval for new name from all members of trust that owns all lots on the road. APPROVED. Tilton, Off Watcha Path (25-4.11, 25-4.12, 25-4.13)

Zoning Bylaw Amendments:

In November, the Planning Board took up a number of potential changes to the Zoning Bylaw, summarized as follows:

- Definitions (Section 1.3)
 - Frontage –Building Inspector requests a definition.
 - Front Lot Line Building Inspector requests a definition.
 - Pool House Building Inspector requests definition for a pool house.
 - Accessory Building or Use Building Inspector requests separate definitions for accessory building and accessory use.
 - Mean Natural Grade Building Inspector requests revision of the definition of Mean Natural Grade.
- Gross Floor Area
 - Building Inspector and others have suggested that only UNFINISHED basements not be counted towards gross floor area.
- Setback / Setback Area
 - Building Inspector and Planning Administrator recommend that definitions for 'setback' and 'setback area' be added.
 - The Definition and Use of Setback Areas (Section 1.4)
 - Building Inspector has requested clarification as to what is allowable in setback areas.
- Cape Pogue DCPC (Section 5.4)
 - Marine Advisory Committee recommend changes to Membership of Cape Pogue Advisory Committee, and authorization to Harbormaster and Zoning Enforcement Officer to cooperatively oversee and enforce regulations and special permits.
- Permitted Uses Clarification regarding existing dwellings (section 8.4.A.8)
 - Building Inspector has requested clarification as to allowed actions for existing non-conforming structures.
- Clarify language regarding Height of buildings; elevated decks and porches. (Section 10.1.C.1)
 - Building Inspector has requested clarification related to measurement of structure height measured against Mean Natural Grade.
- Allow Small Structures By Right on Nonconforming Lots. (Section 10.1.G)
 - Planning Administrator recommends allowing small 'utility' (small, single-story, non-habitable) structures by right on non-conforming lots.
- Simplify Review Process of "Accessory Apartments" (Section 10.3.D)



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- ZBA has recommended changes to "Accessory Apartment" language, streamlining the application process (eliminating regulation requiring sequential application for HDC and ZBA approvals)
- Sound Treatment for mechanical equipment:
 - Require all pool equipment placed in a sound-insulated structure, or behind sound-insulated panels.

Senior Residential Developments:

The Planning Board is considering the addition of a new section of the Zoning Bylaw that would allow and condition approval for large "Senior Residential Developments", in order to provide for a variety of housing types, settings, and residential services to meet the needs of people as they age, and people with disabilities. Developments are to be reviewed for density, style of development, ease of access, compliance with state ADA laws and codes, compatibility with the immediate area, energy efficient design, on-site energy generation, staff housing capacity, and other criteria. Work in this area is ongoing.

Other Work:

- The Planning Board noted some tree-clearing work done at 59 North Street, the cell-tower site. Board Members expressed concern about the condition of the site as work progressed; however, upon completion, workers left the site in a satisfactory condition.
- The board engaged in an informal discussion about a cylinder-gas storage and retail sales operation in the B-II district. The board has not received any specific proposal.
- Planning Board staff continues to work with the Edgartown Highway Department, the MVC Commission, and Mass DOT in considering proposals to improve pedestrian and bicycle safety along the "Middle Main Street" corridor, as well as on Pease Point Way North from Main Street to Winter Street.
- The Planning Board continues to engage on a regional level with other Island Planning Boards.
 Negotiations are ongoing to prepare for an all-island Planning Board meeting after the first of the year.
- Staff continued to provide remote video conferencing technical assistance to other departments.
- Staff and board members participated in meetings through the MVC (including the LUPC, Climate Action Task Force, JTC, etc.)

As always, the Planning Board welcomes input from Town boards, committees and residents on all matters.
