PROPOSITION 2 1/2 AND BALLOT QUESTIONS

Since Proposition 2 1/2 went into effect in 1981, a levy limit for each community is annually calculated by the Department of Revenue. A community's levy limit is the maximum amount in real and personal property taxes it can levy.

Edgartown's tax levy in Fiscal Year 2018 is \$31,936,228.50. Edgartown's tax levy in Fiscal Year 2017 was \$27,706,749.38, this is an increase of approximately 15%. The large increase is due partly to the 1.5 million dollar purchase of the Yellow House, which was paid for with no borrowing. The tax rate for FY2018 is \$3.87 per \$1,000.00 of property value, last year's rate was \$3.55.

What is an Override?

For towns needing to increase taxes more than the automatic annual 2.5% and new construction increases, there is the override process. In order for an override to pass, all three of the following must occur:

A majority vote of the town's Selectmen is required to allow the item to be placed on the ballot. Override questions must be presented in dollar terms and must specify the purpose of the override.

The appropriation must be approved at Town Meeting. If the article is funded by debt, the usual 2/3 vote is necessary.

A majority of the ballot vote of approval at Town election.

Types of Overrides

1. General Overrides

The override is generally used to finance Town services. Once passed, the levy limit is calculated by adding the amount of the override to the previous year's levy limit. The override therefore results in a "increase in the levy limit.

2. Debt Exclusion and Capital Outlay Exclusion

The Town can access taxes in excess of its levy limit for the payment of certain capital projects and for the payment of specified debt service costs. An exclusion for the purpose of raising funds for debt service costs is referred to as a DEBT EXCLUSION and an exclusion for the purpose of raising funds for capital project cost is referred to as a CAPITAL OUTLAY EXPENDITURE EXCLUSION.

The additional amount for the payment of debt service is added to the levy limit for the life of the debt only. The additional amount for the payment of the capital project cost is added to the levy limit only for the year in which the project is being undertaken. Unlike operation overrides, exclusions do not become part of the base upon which the levy limit is calculated for future years. It represents a temporary increase in the levy limit.

FINANCIAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Edgartown:

As the Financial Advisory Committee, our main responsibility is to facilitate effective decision making at Town Meetings by advising and providing recommendations on budget, articles, and other areas of finance. The recommendations reflect countless hours of proposal and budget analysis, information gathering, dialogue, debate, feedback, and collaboration with town boards, committees and other regional agencies.

In December we met with the Capital Programs Committee to review the 5-year plan for expense requests in excess of \$100,000. This budget season there was much dialogue regarding the construction of a new hangar at the Katama Airport and also the major work and upgrades at the Wastewater Facility. It was recommended that all Wastewater projects be consolidated, inevitably saving the town a considerable amount in administrative/bidding costs. Starting in January the committee met with most departments and committees and to go over their proposed budgets and articles.

Our tax base continues to remain strong, and our revenues have been steady and taxes paid. Our credit rating remains high at Aa2. There will be several override questions this year. The overall operating budget represents an increase of 7% over last year. Cost of living adjustment has been proposed for 2% this year, in line with other

communities in our area. The Town went through a complete salary review last year. Those new salaries were adopted at a Special Town Meeting in November. There had not been a comprehensive review in approximately ten years. This has added significantly to the operating budget for Fiscal Year 2019.

The Town's stabilization fund is healthy at \$2,621,741.40. We continue to appropriate monies to fund Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB). This year we are appropriating \$150,000.00 to be used for these unfunded liabilities.

Our committee would like to thank Thomas Durawa for his years of service to the Committee and Gail Avakian for her work as the FinCom Assistant. We would also like to welcome Juliet Mulinare as the new FinCom Assistant.

FREE CASH, STABILIZATION FUND AND STATE REVENUES & CHARGES (Definitions at back of this booklet)

Free Cash was certified by the Massachusetts Department of Revenue in the amount of \$2,277,345.00 effective for the Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2018. There was a Special Town Meeting held on November 14, 2017. There will be a Special Town Meeting just prior to the Annual Town Meeting on April 10, 2018. The requests from Free Cash for both Special Town Meetings total \$556,551.26. The requests on the Annual Town Meeting warrant for April 10, 2018 from Free Cash will total \$1,339,897.41. We are taking an additional \$200,000.00 from Free Cash to reduce the tax rate. That will leave us with a balance of \$180,896.33 in our Free Cash for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2018. Our Stabilization Fund

Balance is \$2,621,741.40.

This year we are appropriating \$150,000.00 to be invested in the Dukes County Pooled OPEB Trust Fund for Other Post Retirement Benefits. Edgartown's investments through January 1, 2018 are \$2,078,424.07.

State revenues for Fiscal Year 2018 were \$2,175,707.00, an increase of \$9,957.00. State Charges for Fiscal Year 2018 were \$1,642,278.00, which represented an increase of \$119,723.00.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town, qualified to vote in elections and Town affairs, to meet in the Old Whaling Church (Methodist Church) on Main Street in said Edgartown on Tuesday, the tenth day of April, Two Thousand Eighteen at seven o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on the Articles in this Warrant:

ARTICLE 1. PURCHASE OF BURIAL PLOTS

- 1. Only Edgartown residents and or taxpayers may purchase a lot. At the time of lot purchase, the residents name must appear on the town's registered voters or taxpayers list. One lot may be purchased per family.
- Private sales of cemetery lots are prohibited. Lot owners must sell the lot back to the Town of Edgartown for the original purchase price. The Town of Edgartown will resell the lot at the prevailing price.
- 3. A lot purchaser acquires only the right to burial and is subject to the regulations of the cemetery. The purchaser does not retain the title to the land.
- 4. A full grave lot consists of four grave plots.
 - A full lot (10' x 20') has four burial plots. The cost of a full lot is \$2800.00
 - A half lot (10' x10') has two burial plots. The cost of a half lot is \$1400.00
- 5. Each burial plot may contain one casket or six cremation urns. Caskets are not double stacked.
- 6. A cremation lot (4' x 4') may accommodate two urns. The cost of a cremation lot is \$250.00

BURIALS

7. All cemetery lots must be paid for at the time of purchase. No interment or inurnments will be made until the lot is paid in full.

- 8. All interments or inurnments and removals are made subject to orders and laws of properly constituted authorities of Town, County and State.
- Cemetery officials shall be notified prior to interments or inurnments. Cemetery officials must have one week's notice prior to interments, inurnments or removals
- Once a casket or urn is interned within the cemetery no one shall be permitted to exhume it without a court order
- 11. No interment or inurnment shall be made in any lot other then the family of the lot owner unless written permission is furnished by the surviving heirs.
- 12. All interments shall be in a permanent container such as cement or bronze vaults or in a concrete sectional vault. All inurnments shall be in a permanent container

MONUMNETS, PLANTINGS

- 13. It is the duty of the lot owners to notify cemetery officials of any change of address.
- 14. Under current cemetery regulations, a full lot can contain up to 24 burials (4 caskets or 24 urns). It is therefore recommended that the original owners appoint a designated signer among their heirs who will be in charge of who can be buried in the lot. When appropriate that person can appoint one or more person in the third generation to take over as designated signer. This process can be repeated as necessary through subsequent generations.

In the absence of a designated signer, two members of the senior generation must sign an interment order for anyone to be interned in the lot (Spouses and members of subsequent generations are not authorized to sign an internment order.)

If the original owners do not appoint a designated signer, the current senior generation may select a designated signer. To do so, every member of their generation must notify the Cemetery Office in writing that they accept the person selected as the designated signer.

- 15. No granite or concrete curbing or mounding of individual lots shall be permitted in any town cemetery.
- 16. Flat gravestones and corner bounds shall be level with the present grade in all town cemeteries.
- 17. All monuments shall be set on four foot deep concrete foundations in all cemeteries, and all markers at a minimum of two feet deep foundations.

- 18. No work or plantings shall be done in the town cemeteries without the permission of the Commissioners. Certain plantings are not permitted. Please see Administrative Assistant for details.
- 19. The Edgartown Cemetery Department has authority to remove from lots all articles and plantings placed which do not conform to the standards maintained.
- 20. Permanent irrigation systems are not permitted in Town cemeteries.
- 21. The Cemetery Commissioners are empowered to enforce all regulations. They shall have supervision and control of all persons in the Town of Edgartown Cemeteries, including the conduct of funerals and traffic.
- 22. The Town of Edgartown disclaims responsibility for any damage or injury to any monument or markers in any of the town cemeteries.

"Curb Cuts": The providing of vehicular ingress and/or egress from a private property and an accepted way.

"De Minimis": minor works which may have little to no material effect on a given structure or development, and therefore would not require a special permit, but does require an application for an exemption. Such determination would not apply to application or permitting requirements established by other entities, such as the Conservation Commission, Historic District Commission, the Town of Edgartown Building Department, or the MV Commission.

"Demolition": The removal or dismantling of existing construction, in whole or in part, with or without the intent to replace the construction so affected."

"Fence": A non-living structure or partition, designed to: establish a boundary; enclose or separate an area of land, a landscape feature, or an object located on land; prevent intrusions from without or straying from within; provide security or protection; shield from within or without against noise or view; or, other similar purpose. A fence may be, but is not limited to, structures or partitions made of wood, stone, metal or other materials.

"Gross Floor Area": The sum of the horizontal areas of all stories of a building, or several buildings, as measured from the exterior face of exterior walls, or from the center line of a party wall separating two buildings on the same lot. Gross Floor Area for a single lot shall include garages, sheds, gazebos, enclosed porches, screen porches, enclosed decks, guest buildings, and other accessory buildings; Gross Floor Area shall not include basements, crawl spaces, attics, open porches, or open decks.

"Livable Floor Space": Any square footage that is (a) served by permanently installed heating or air-conditioning systems, (b) that is directly accessible from other occupiable areas through an interior door or hallway, (c) finished with walls, floors and ceilings of materials generally accepted for interior construction, and (d) excluding any area with a ceiling height of less than five feet

"Lot line": A line of record bounding a lot that divides one lot from another lot or from a public or private right of way.

"Marina": A facility which provides dockage or berthing for more than five (5) vessels and may also provide the services of a Vessel Service Facility.

"Mean Natural Grade": The natural grade, relative to a given structure. The mean natural grade shall be calculated by measuring the natural elevation at the four (4) most remote corners of a structure to the height of the highest point of the structure, and dividing the aggregate number of these heights by four (4).

"Renovation": The alteration or removal of any part of an existing structure for the purpose of maintenance or improvement without change to the existing footprint or height of the structure.

"Vessel Service Facility": A commercial facility providing one or more of the following: vessel construction, repair or servicing; vessel storage, hauling and launching; the sale of vessels; the sale of supplies and services for vessels and their equipment and accessories; berthing or dockage facilities for not more than five (5) vessels not being serviced or repaired.

Further amend Section 11.24 – "Curb Cuts and Driveways" as follows:

In the R-5, B-I and B-II districts, there shall be a maximum of one 16' wide curb cut per lot on a public street. A curb cut shall not exceed 16' in width. All new curb cuts, or modifications to existing curb cuts after January 7, 2014 shall require a site plan review from approval by the Planning Board. The curb cut design, or its regular use, shall not impair access along the public street or sidewalk.

TOWN MEETING PROCEDURE GUIDELINES

The Moderator has absolute control of the Town Meeting.

The General Laws Chapter 39 Section 15: The Moderator shall preside and regulate the proceedings, decide all questions of order, and make public declaration of all votes. The Moderator recognizes speakers from the floor, and while they are speaking allows no interruptions except when a point of order is raised.

When a voter wishes to speak he may rise, say "Mr. Moderator," and wait for recognition. Then, standing at a microphone, he should give his name. The voter may continue, with due regard to reasonable brevity, as long as he speaks directly to the question under discussion.

MOTIONS

MAIN motions are usually on articles in the Town Warrant. They are made, seconded, then open for consideration. Articles are not always brought before the Meeting in the order of their appearance in the Warrant.

SECONDARY motions are motions which refer to main motions. The Meeting is usually limited to the discussion of two secondary motions at one time. Secondary motions usually amend, postpone, or limit consideration.

AMEND

Amendments may be offered by any voter to the motion under discussion, provided the scope of the original motion is not enlarged or altered. Amendments are seconded and discussed; they require a majority vote to carry (pass). An amendment need not be voted upon if the proposed change is agreeable to the proponents of the original motion. Voters are encouraged to submit amendments in writing.

POSTPONE

- 1. To refer to committee "Commit"; If changes in a main motion are numerous, take much time, or require additional information, it is wise to commit the article to a committee. This secondary motion should specify which board or committee. If proposing a new committee, specify how many members, how appointments are to be made and when the committee should report.
- 2. **Postpone to a definite time**; defers action on a main motion to a stated hour, usually during the Meeting. At the hour specified, it is returned to the floor when a motion is made that the deferred article be considered.
- **3.** "Lay on Table" intends to temporarily lay aside an article. Not debatable; majority vote carries. (To "Take from Table" see RECONSIDERATION.) An article not taken from table before the meeting adjourns is dead. To be considered at a subsequent meeting, it must reappear in the Warrant for that meeting.
- **4.** "Take no action" "Pass over" "Postpone indefinitely" are debatable motions and require majority vote. The intent is to defeat the motion.

LIMIT CONSIDERATION

- 1. Limit Debate: This secondary motion requests vote to be taken at a specific time. Requires 2/3 majority vote.
- 2. "Move the Previous Question" demands an immediate vote on any motions under consideration. May not be debated or amended. Requires 2/3 vote to carry.

POINT OF ORDER

If a voter questions the legality or propriety of the proceedings, he may rise, interrupt the speaker and say, "Mr. Moderator, I rise to a point of order" or "question of privilege".

RECONSIDERATION

To consider a tabled motion "Take from Table". The motion to consider a tabled question requires a majority vote and can be made at any time when no other question is before the Meeting.

TO RECONSIDER AN ARTICLE ONCE ACTED UPON AND DISPOSED OF

- 1. **Move to reconsider the vote:** This motion may be made by one who voted on the prevailing side of a motion which has been adopted, rejected or postponed indefinitely and wishes to change his views.
- 2. **To rescind.** If no one who voted on the prevailing side is willing to move to reconsider, any voter may move to rescind the vote on the main motion. Usually a 2/3 vote is required.

VOTES ON MAIN MOTIONS

1. Usually majority of those attending carries.

Exceptions:

2/3 majority vote required borrowing of money; appropriations for land purchase; land purchase for public domain; sale or abandonment of unneeded land; abandonment of projects for which money has been borrowed; appropriation for celebration of settlement or incorporation; zoning by-laws.

4/5 usually required payment of a bill for which insufficient appropriations were made in previous year.

MODERATOR'S RULES REGARDING TOWN MEETINGS

Priority shall be given to Registered Voters of the Town for admission to all Town Meetings, whether Annual or Special meetings. Therefore the following rules shall apply:

- 1. Prior to admission to the Hall, persons desiring admittance shall check in with the Registrars of Voters who shall be present at the main entrance with Voter Registration Lists.
- 2. Town officials and voters who desire to have a non-voter present to speak on any article of which he may have special knowledge or expertise should request the Moderator in writing at least seven days prior to the meeting that the non-voter be allowed to be present. The request should briefly state the subject matter and articles to which the non-voter desires to address the meeting. If the Moderator allows the non-voter to be present, he shall so inform the Registrars of Voters.
- 3. The Registrars of Voters shall admit to the meeting all duly registered voters of the Town and all persons whom the Moderator has informed them to admit.
- 4. Five minutes prior to the time the meeting is scheduled to begin, if there are sufficient seats for the registered voters present, plus an adequate reserve for later arriving voters, the Registrars may admit non-voters. Admitted non-voters shall not mingle with registered voters. They shall be seated in an area distinguishable from the remainder of the meeting so that the Tellers and Moderator can easily determine those who have a right to vote and those who do not.
- 5. Non-voters admitted to a Town Meeting shall not address the Meeting without the permission of the Moderator and shall make no remarks or comments during debate or participate in voting.

The Moderator retains the right to have any voter or non-voter removed from the Meeting.

TOWN MEETING TERMINOLOGY

CHERRY SHEET

This is a cherry red form which shows all of the State and County charges and reimbursements to the Town as certified by the Massachusetts Department of Revenue.

RESERVE FUND

This fund may be established by the voters at an ANNUAL TOWN MEETING or Special Town Meeting and may be composed of (a) an appropriation (not exceeding 5% of the tax levy of the preceding year), (b) money transferred from Overlay Reserve, or (c) both.

Any unexpired balance thereof at the end of the year is closed out to the surplus revenue (E & D) except, however, that from such balance there shall first be deducted and credited back to Overlay Reserve, to the extent possible, a sum equal to that amount, if any, which was appropriated from the Reserve Fund.

Transfers from the Reserve Fund are within the exclusive control of the Financial Advisory Committee.

STABILIZATION FUND

A fund set up by Town meeting vote under the provisions of Section 5b, Chapter 40 of the Massachusetts General Laws, not to exceed 10% of the amount raised in the preceding fiscal year by taxation of Real Estate and Tangible Personal Property. The aggregate amount in the fund at any time shall not exceed 10% of the equalized valuation of the Town. Any interest shall be added to and become a part of the fund. Appropriations from this fund may be made for any purpose. A two-thirds vote is required.

SURPLUS REVENUE - FREE CASH

Generally referred to as Excess and Deficiency, though that phrase nowhere appears in the statutes. This fund represents the amount by which Cash, Accounts Receivable and other floating assets exceed the liabilities and reserves. This amount of the Excess and Deficiency account over and above uncollected taxes of prior years constitutes "Free Cash" or "Available Funds" and is certified to the Town by the Director of Accounts of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, effective July first of each year.
