#### Conservation Agent: Submitted by Jane Varkonda:

The Commission held one public meeting in November.

November 17, 2021: Hedjen Trust – new dwelling, pool, pool house, view channels and related. Continued for a site inspection and additional information requested. Beach Trees – demolition of the existing house, construction of a new dwelling, pool and related facilities. Continued for a site inspection and additional information. Chappy House LLC – approval of a guesthouse construction and related facilities. Alexander/Gammill – continued until the next meeting. Walsh – request for modifications to permit –applicant did not attend the meeting. Waldron – modifications to permit – applicant did not attend the meeting. Katama Farm- the month by month lease for TTOR to run the education permit was granted until the end of December. Winter and summer events were reviewed and will be approved at the discretion of the Commission's agent and the Board of Health. New hire for the Conservation Assistant – The Commission reviewed the two applicants



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under consideration for the post. After discussions with the interview committee the Commission unanimously voted to hire Kara Shemeth.

The volume of paperwork for applications and certificates of compliance requests had quite the uptick, for end of year closings and tax purposes. The Commission formed the Fisherman's Landing Stewardship Committee to assist in refining current rules and regulations for the use of the landing and to prepare for a possible gift of land. The Commission continued with final lease preparation for Katama farm. Katama Airfield and the North Triangle were burned by The Mass. Division of Fisheries and Wildlife with assistance from the Nature Conservancy and local fire personnel. The agent continued working on the restoration of the Dunes at the Left Fork and Norton Point and the moving of the bathhouse structure.

In November 2021, the Anchors brought back some popular programming at our participants' urging, including Knitting for Charity and board games. The conversation group continued to be an activity that drew a consistent crowd. Many in this group commented on the fact that they have gained so much from being together again (while masked), and being able to talk with others about current events and the impact the pandemic has had on their lives.

The ECOA continued to work with Healthy Aging MV, The Vineyard Transit Authority and the MV Transportation Coalition on the development of a pilot program for a COA van. This van would be used to



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take Edgartown older adults on a fixed route to the grocery store, the pharmacy and the post office, as well as take people on enrichment outings and to our programming.

The staff worked with representatives at Town Hall to re-establish the Senior Tax Write Off program post-Covid. We expect to match volunteers with interested Edgartown departments in the beginning of 2022.

ECOA staff worked with Elder Services of the Cape and Islands and the Edgartown Police Department to distribute Thanksgiving meals to residents in need. We welcomed a donation of frozen scallops from local shellfishermen Donnie and Doug Benefit, and this gift was met with great enthusiasm from our participants. We continued to support older adults' food scarcity needs through surplus food distribution, our frozen soup program, helping them to sign up for SNAP benefits and the utilization of other local food resources.

### **Energy Committee: Submitted by Alan Strahler:**

- Committee Chair Alan Strahler met virtually with Mark Friedman and Shelley Einbinder of the Edgartown School on November 3 at their request to discuss future energy savings options for the school's HVAC system, as well as some nearer-term energy conservation measures to reduce the school's energy cost.
- On November 5, IT Manager Adam Darack added the Energy Committee to the list of Town departments on the Town web site along with a linked web page.
- The Energy Committee met virtually on November 18. Discussions included: Contents of the new committee page on the Town web site; a possible Town Climate Committee; the Committee's energy questionnaire for Town residents to gauge their understanding and interest in the transition to renewable energy appliances, transportation, and solar energy; liaison with the MVC Climate Action Plan; liaison with the Town's Master Plan Steering Committee; and planning for a five-year Energy Plan for the Town. Ongoing projects discussed included energy savings measures for Town buildings, the Town's application to join the Green Community program, car chargers for the Park and Ride Lot, and the status of the RFP process for a lease of the closed landfill on Meshacket Road for development of a solar energy facility.
- On November 19, Alan met with Highway Superintendent Allan DeBettencourt at the Park and Ride lot to review the planned location of the Level-2 vehicle chargers. An issue with storm water flooding was identified, and the planned location of the chargers was changed to the north end of the second and third rows. Alan delivered information to Eversource describing the new location on November 22.
- Also on November 19, Alan attended the first meeting of the MVC Climate Action Plan Steering Committee as the Edgartown representative.
