Conservation Agent: Submitted by Jane Varkonda:

February 9, 2022: Eiffel Nominee Trust – Construction and maintenance of an addition to an existing dwelling, new garage, swimming pool, septic and related landscaping; Santana – trim, prune and remove vegetation in a view corridor and landscaping adjacent to the house; Vineyard Vibes – replace an existing single family dwelling with new dwelling, pool and poolhouse; Sissleman – construction of a house, garage, swimming pool, garage, septic and site improvement including significant grading to get the house above the 100 year flood zone.

The Commission approved the Annual Scoops 5k at Katama Farm. The Commission approved a 30 day extension of the TTOR lease for the educational programming at Katama Farm. Commission Gibbs noted that the flag pole, surf boat and Whale Tail down next to the Anchors needs some work. Varkonda noted that she would reach out to the person who has worked on the items before for an estimate. The Commission reviewed and approved a revised fee schedule.



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February 23, 2022: Edgartown Golf Club –construction of a duplex unit for employee housing; Roberts and Park – construction and maintenance of a dwelling, garage, pool, pool house, septic, well and associated landscaping; Santana – construction of a house, septic, and associated utilities and landscaping.

With a temporary lull in the volume of office paperwork, the Agent was able to inspect several ongoing and previously completed construction projects which revealed multiple violation of permits issued by the office. Several were direct alteration of wetlands. The Agent continued to supervise the nourishment of Norton Point and the Left Fork and the relocation of the bath house further landward. The Commission's assistant researched and proposed a new fee schedule for permits and other actions issued by this office. The Agent participated in the Cape Poge DCPC Committee meeting and regularly attended the Dredge Committee and Fishermen's Landing Committee.

February 2022 marked another milestone for the ECOA as we were able to welcome people back into our building for in-person programming.

Our meals program continued to be a takeout operation, and we maintained our meal delivery program for our most vulnerable residents. Our exercise class instructors and participants were probably the most enthused with this change in offerings, and our building once again filled with the sounds of older adults enjoying the sense of community that we share at the Anchors.



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We continued to host regular piano recitals (via Zoom) by Adele Dreyer and Michael Haydn, and these proved to be very popular and enjoyable. We hosted two book talks by local authors Tom Dresser and Carolyn O'Daly. Our conversations group welcomed the change to the in-person setting, and it continues to be a constant thread in our programming.

We continue to make plans for the warmer months, when we hope to take participants to Boston and back to Nantucket for some fun and memorable experiences.

Energy Committee: Submitted by Alan Strahler:

- The Energy Committee met on February 3. Discussions included (1) applications for the new Twn Climate Committee; (2) status of the requested improvements to the committee's web page on the Town website; (3) status of the Green Community Application and of its Energy Reduction Plan and Fuel Efficient Vehicle Policy; (4) status of installation of Level-2 chargers at the town Park and Ride lot; and (5) status of the request for Free Cash for a DC fast charger for electric vehicles. The committee was also updated on revised Edgartown School lighting savings measures and leasing of the Town's closed landfill for solar power development.
- Committee Chair Alan Strahler attended a virtual meeting of the Cape Light Compact as the board member representing Edgartown on February 9.
- Also on February 9, Alan presented the Energy Reduction Plan and Fuel Efficient Vehicle Policy to the School Committee for their approval, as required for the Town's Green Community application. The School Committee voted unanimously to approve the plan and policy.
- At the Selectboard's meeting of February 14, Alan presented the Fuel Efficient Vehicle Policy for approval. The policy was approved unanimously.
- On February 16-19, Alan and Committee Members Kat Monterosso and Jack Ensor attended various meetings and workshops presented by consultants for the Edgartown Master Plan.
- On February 25, Alan convened the first meeting of the Edgartown Climate Committee, presiding over the election of the committee's chair. He will continue to serve as an advisor to the Climate Committee as requested.

Planning Board: Submitted by Alex Cervone

The Planning Board met once in February on the 15th. Meetings continued through remote participation, in accordance with Chapter 53 of the Acts of 2020.

Planning Board Business:

The Board continued a public hearing relative to a request to construct and operate a Senior Residential Facility, comprised of a seventy (70) bedroom skilled nursing facility, to be contained within five (5) "houses", each of - which will have fourteen (14) bedrooms; also to construct a seventy-six (76) bedroom Workforce Housing complex, consisting of seven (7) structures; also to conduct site activities including clearing of land, grubbing, grading, filling, trenching, installation of utilities, construction of support structures, roads and parking areas, construction of paths, lighting,



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and landscape elements, and all other work necessary thereto. Quorum was not established and it was decided to continue the public hearing to March 1, 2022 at 5:30 PM.

The Board reviewed a request for endorsement of ANR plan for Arch Building & Home Development and Vasiliadis Realty Trust. After review, the Board agreed to endorse the plan as not requiring approval under the Subdivision Control Law. The properties are located at Assessor's parcels 44-10.3141 & 44-10.3142.

The Board reviewed a request for De Minimis Determination for Terrence P. McCourt, Trustee. After a presentation and deliberation the Board voted to deny the request as the changes were too substantial from the original plan. Applicant will need to present new plan at a public hearing at a date to be determined. The property is located at 85 Chappaquiddick Road, Assessor's parcel 30-63. Public Comment Welcome

Shellfish: Submitted by Rob Morrison:

February 2022 saw license holders participating in a variety of fisheries during the month. The two primary fisheries were the commercial bay scallop fishery in Cape Pogue, and the commercial oyster fishery in Sengekontacket.

License holders participating in the commercial scallop fishery have their catch checked and recorded daily by department staff at North Wharf. The Sengekontacket oyster fishery was created by the Shellfish Department through their annual propagation effort. 500,000 oyster seed are grown by the department annually. These oysters are distributed throughout Sengekontacket to be harvested both recreationally and commercially. Commercial oyster catch is recorded in 100 count bags.

Recreational fishing for shellfish species including bay scallops, steamer clams, quahogs, and oysters took place in all Edgartown bodies of water open to fishing. Participation in recreational shell fishing is typically low in February Due to weather conditions.



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The month of February saw an increase in commercial Bay Scallop landings from January. This was due to weather and temperature allowing fisherman more fishable days.

Water Department: Submitted by William Chapman:

- Five water services were installed, with several more applications for service reviewed.
- Monthly bacteriological and quarterly samples were collected and analyzed.
- The results of the most recent PFAS6 samples were received with all wells showing free of PFAS6 contaminants.
- A water main extension on Davis Lane was completed. As a result, a new fire hydrant was added to the distribution system.
- All facilities were cleared of snow during and after the snowstorm.
- The relocated water main on Church Street is complete, has passed all applicable requirements and has been placed in service.
- Our S.C.A.D.A. system received a major upgrade to improve the redundancy of automated operation.
 Additionally, two more radio frequencies were secured to add increased reliability in the radio transmitted data.
- The Water Department was included in a discussion on a proposal to extend water mains in a strategic manner through the state forest to provide fire protection. The discussion revealed that there are other potential advantages to the proposal including an additional interconnection with Oak Bluffs Water District and looping the western edge of the water system.
