Conservation Agent: Submitted by Jane Varkonda:

March 9, 2022: L Patrick Gage – to reduce the lawn size to meet Town regulation; to allow the view channels to maintain, but modify the minimum height allow from 6 to 5 feet, to allow the boardwalk to remain, but modified with correct spacing over the wetlands; 23 Kelley Street LLC-renovations and additions and site drainage; Terrence McCourt, Tr. – removing an existing well house roof, building a new utility shed, construction of a new boardwalk, proposed perimeter skirting around the guesthouse and detached bedrooms; septic tank and pump chamber installation, restoration of construction access, removal of vegetation that died, replanting of vegetation, removal of the irrigation system – many items being removed under an Enforcement Order and non compliance with existing permits; Catalina – review of proposed house and landscape lighting referred to the Commission by the Agent due to non compliance with dark sky requirements. The proposal was denied.

March 23, 2022: Fairwinds Property of Chappaquiddick Limited Partnership – addition to an existing home; Santana – construction of a new dwelling, guest house, septic, swimming pool, utilities and landscaping.



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Audmer, LLC – proposed construction of a pool, pool fence, equipment shed and terrace; 24 Navy Way – construction of a pool house and roof top deck; Caleb Pond Beach Assoc – creation of a 5 car parking lot on a coastal dune; Malm – stone retaining wall; Parks and Roberts – construction of a new dwelling, garage, pool, pool house, septic, well, driveway and utilities; Kelley St LLC – modifications, additions and site drainage.

March saw a flurry of applications as spring quickly came upon us. Pools and accessory structures along with the main dwelling continue to be the theme for construction in Edgartown lately. The dunes at South Beach were planted with beach grass and we were fortunate enough to get the snow fence installed at the reconstructed dunes at the Right Fork. The beach just to the west of the right fork continues to erode at an alarming rate so much so the ocean is now visible from Atlantic Ave for the first time. Conservation and Parks Dept are working closely with the Woods Hole Group to apply for another grant from the Mass. Office of Coastal Zone Management for funds to nourish South Beach behind what is left of the primary dune this coming winter. The biggest hurdle will be finding the sand to put on the beach. Spring is sprung at the Katama Farm, the fields have been worked on by Morning Glory Farm and their cattle are on premises. The property remains open to the public and I thank the Land Bank for maintaining the perimeter trail that surrounds the fields south of Aero Avenue.

Council on Aging: Submitted by Lyndsay Famariss:

March 2022 was a busy month at the Anchors. We continued to welcome people to the building for our regular programming, and we offered a new weekly play reading group that proved to be popular. AARP



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volunteer leaders John and Dorothy Dropick offered their time once again this year to prepare Edgartown older adults' taxes. A Zoom program presented by the MA Department of Consumer Affairs on scams attracted a sizable group of attendees.

The ECOA has been fortunate to be able to offer programs by the talented musicians Michael Hayden and Adele Dreyer. Since the pandemic began, these programs have been presented via Zoom, but when conditions allow, we hope to welcome them back for live concerts.

An important part of our Outreach work is collaborating with the Edgartown Police Department and the EMTs. Working together, we're able to better serve the needs of the Town's most vulnerable residents. This month saw us referring people to our SHINE counselor, Fuel Assistance and to various social service agencies. Our work continued in March to launch a joint effort with the Vineyard Transit Authority and Healthy Aging MV to operate a van in Edgartown to provide transportation on a weekly shopping route as well as rides to our programming events.

Energy Committee: Submitted by Alan Strahler:

- On March 1, Committee Chair Alan Strahler met with the Vineyard Power Development Fund Advisory Committee as the Edgartown representative.
- The Energy Committee met on March 3. Reports and discussions concerned (1) the first meeting of the new town Climate Committee; (2) status of the requested improvements to the committee's web page on the town website; (3) status of the Green Community Application; (4) status of installation of Level-2 chargers at the town Park and Ride lot; and (5) filling the vacancy on the Committee and possibly adding new members. Alan also updated the Committee on the leasing of the town's closed landfill for solar power development and the nature of the Vineyard Power Resiliency/Affordability Program.
- Alan attended a meeting of the Cape Light Compact Board on March 9 as the Edgartown Board Member.
- On March 21, Alan met with Mark Friedman, Martha's Vineyard School Business Administrator, and Alex Dwyer and Shaun Hammond of Rise Engineering regarding more energy-efficient and better lighting for Edgartown School.
- Alan and Committee Member Jack Ensor attended a meeting of Town department heads and officials on March 24 to hear more about and discuss the MVC's Climate Action Plan.

The Planning Board met three times in March on the 1st, 15th and 22nd. Meetings continued through remote participation, in accordance with Chapter 53 of the Acts of 2020

Planning Board Business:

The board continued a public hearing to consider a request to construct and operate a Senior Residential Facility, comprised of a seventy (70) bedroom skilled nursing facility, to be contained within five (5) "houses", each of which will have fourteen (14) bedrooms; also to construct a seventy-six (76) bedroom Workforce Housing complex, consisting of seven (7) structures; also to conduct site activities including clearing of land, grubbing, grading, filling, trenching, installation of utilities, construction of support structures, roads and parking areas, construction of paths, lighting, and landscape elements, and all other work necessary thereto. The property is located at 490 Edgartown-Vineyard Haven Road (11B-243). After considerable presentation and discussion, the hearing was continued to May 3, 2022

The board reviewed an application for a modification to a previously approved ANR plan. The property is located on Holly Bear Lane (12B-129.5). After brief deliberation, the ANR plan was unanimously endorsed as not needing approval under the subdivision control laws.

The board held a public hearing to review an application for Martha's Vineyard Community Services to hold their annual Possible Dreams auction at the Winnetu Resort. The event will be the same as previously held. There is expected to be approximately 200 people. Limited parking available for vendors and VIPs, with shuttle access to abutting road for other attendees. The time has been selected around the beach and dinner rushes. After brief deliberation, the board voted unanimously to approve the application as presented.

The board held a public hearing to review an application submitted by Stop and Shop for approval of a modification to the Special Permit in order to construct a temporary outdoor display to sell garden and outdoor products. This will be setup the same exact way as previous years. After brief deliberation, the board voted unanimously to approve the application as presented.

The board held a public hearing to review an application to replace a pre-existing dwelling on a nonconforming lot with a new single-family dwelling which meets R-60 setback requirements and to exceed the height restriction of the Coastal District in conjunction with the construction of an in-



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ground pool. The property is located at 12 Katama Point Road (46-31). After much presentations, deliberation, a site visit and continuation of the public hearing, the board voted unanimously to approve the project as presented with two added conditions concerning the pool equipment shed and on-site management in case of runoff issues.

Shellfish: Submitted by Rob Morrison:

March 2022 saw license holders participating in a variety of fisheries during the month. The two primary fisheries were the commercial bay scallop fishery in Cape Pogue, and the commercial oyster fishery in Sengekontacket.



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License holders participating in the commercial scallop fishery have their catch checked and recorded daily by department staff at North Wharf. The Sengekontacket oyster fishery was created by the Shellfish Department through their annual propagation effort. 500,000 oyster seed are grown by the department annually. These oysters are distributed throughout Sengekontacket to be harvested both recreationally and commercially. Commercial oyster catch is recorded in 100 count bags.

Recreational fishing for shellfish species including bay scallops, steamer clams, quahogs, and oysters took place in all Edgartown bodies of water open to fishing. Participation in recreational shell fishing is typically low in March Due to weather conditions.

The Month of March saw fewer scallops landed than February. As the season comes to an end there are fewer participants in the fishery.

The following are the landings recorded for Commercial Shellfish Permit holders during the month of March 2022: Bay Scallops (Cape Pogue)......410 bushels*
