RE: TTOR's Abandonment of Phase Two of the Norton Point Project and Damage to the Dyke Bridge Bulkhead

Dear Sir or Madam:

I am writing regarding the Selectboard Meeting that took place on January 3, 2023; specifically on the topic of the TTOR's failure to assist with Phase Two of the Norton Point remediation project. My in-laws, Dawn and Victor Colantonio, are residents of 99 Lighthouse Road on Cape Pogue in Chappaquiddick. I have spent a considerable amount of time on Cape Pogue for over a decade now and, unfortunately, I am quite familiar with the TTOR practices out on Norton Point, Leland Beach, and Cape Pogue.

From what I understand, TTOR collected approximately \$100,000.00 in funds from various sources that should have been applied to the Norton Point remediation project. Not only did they fail to make any significant contribution to Phase One of the project, but to make matters even worse, they pulled out from Phase Two of the project in early December. As I am sure you are aware, this put the Town in a compromised position to where they must now rush to complete the project by the summer at an increased expense. On December 28, 2022, the TTOR indicated that they are no longer going to contribute any of the funds they previously received for the remediation project. As was aptly pointed out, this certainly has the optics of being spiteful.

Sadly, news of TTOR's behavior on Norton Point comes as no surprise. It appears that TTOR's delinquency is part of an on-going pattern of behavior that has gotten progressively worse over the last several years. From what I understand, TTOR also receives funds from the US Coast Guard to maintain the Cape Pogue Lighthouse. The once proud symbol of Chappaquiddick has fallen into total disrepair.

The reason I am bringing this up is twofold: First, has TTOR represented to the Town that any unused funds marked for the Norton Point remediation project were returned to their grantors? If not, perhaps TTOR's status as a tax-exempt non-profit organization should be re-evaluated by the appropriate agencies. Second, TTOR's dereliction of duty as it pertains to Norton Point also coincides with the recent deterioration of the Dyke Bridge.

During a recent storm shortly after the Christmas holiday, the Dyke Bridge bulkhead was severely damaged. So much so, that large extensions of rebar pipping have been exposed. These conditions post an undoubted danger to Cape Pogue residents who rely on the bridge as their only means of ingress and egress. Moreover, these conditions can undeniably be attributable to the overuse of the bridge by Over Sand Vehicle (OSV) permit holders precipitated by TTOR's commercial activities. A recent FOIA document request revealed approximately 38,000 bridge users on an annual basis according to a traffic counter.

TTOR's actions can no longer go unchecked. They have profited off this fragile resource for decades now and have left the Town, as well as the Cape Pogue residents, with extreme hardship. My humble recommendation is that the Town closes to bridge to vehicle traffic, except for essential vehicles, until TTOR repairs the Dyke Bridge. Frankly, I believe the Town has legal standing to take the land from the Dyke to the bathing beach for public use under the power of eminent domain.

See Massachusetts Constitution, Part I, Article X; see also M.G.L. Ch. 79. TTOR's inept stewardship of this land has been made patently clear.

To the Edgartown Selectboard:

As seasonal (May-October) residents of Cape Pogue, we write to let you know that we are extremely concerned about the current condition of the bulkhead at the Dike Bridge, specifically the eastern portion of the Dike, which we understand is owned by The Trustees of Reservations (TTOR).

As you most likely are aware by now, recent storms appear to have significantly damaged this portion of the Dike and seriously compromised its integrity (see photos by Rachel Self attached). This presents a serious safety and emergency access issue, not only for the general public, but for Cape Pogue property owners whose only access to their property is through this portion of the dike causeway.

We feel that the Dike's current deplorable condition is a direct result of (1) the total neglect and lack of maintenance by TTOR over the past 10-15 years and (2) overuse of the Dike due to excessive sale of OSV permits by TTOR.

Until proper repairs can be made to the bulkhead by TTOR, is it possible for the Town to prohibit use of the townowned bridge to all but essential vehicles (which we understand to mean emergency maintenance and resident vehicles)?

Dear Commissioners,

Greetings and warm wishes for a productive new year.

At the 12.19.22 ConCom meeting I offered a reply to Mr. Kontje's question, Why so long to object to the Trustees stewardship?

Since 2012 Pogue residents' expressed our concerns in formal annual meetings with the Trustees' leadership. During the transition of Hart-Morrison-Schofield, TTOR stopped talking to us. It was then we realized they never intended to act on our concerns.

My family's displeasure with Trustee stewardship began when Dave Belcher departed. Life on Pogue became progressively worse with repeated harassment, being obstructed from our land and shared right-of-way, repeated trespass, damage to our property and OSVs overburdening of the entire resource. Due to these and other issues, we are suing TTOR in We are also monitoring Selectman, County, DCPC and ConCom meetings. We believe the Wetland Protection Act is intended to prevent people and organizations. i.e., Trustees, from selling a single OSV "permit", let alone unlimited numbers, for the general public go 4-wheeling through undeveloped / unimproved naturally occurring inland wetlands, coastal wetlands, salt marshes, clam flats, through flooded areas, on tidal over-washes, eroding beaches, within intertidal zones, over and through primary beach dunes and below the high water mark (intertidal zone) of Cape Pogue Bay.

It is unconscionable that ConCom could grant TTOR an Order that allows UNLIMITED NUMBERS OF OSVs ALL DAY EVERY DAY to an organization that is unable to even satisfy the first qualification of the Wetland Protection Act, evidence of ownership or control of ALL the land upon which the Order sought will apply.

Dear Selectman,

As property owners at Cape Pogue (59 Lighthouse Road and 17 Road to the Gut), my wife and I are very concerned about the condition of the approach to the Dyke Bridge from the beach. A video was shared after the last storm showing significant damage to the bulkhead, tie bars and exposed holes due to erosion.

For any Cape Pogue property owner this is our only access to our property. Additionally, this is the only access for beach goers, fisherman, shell fisherman and bird watchers wishing to visit Cape Pogue, The Jetties and East Beach.

Beyond the walking hazard due to these conditions, I'm not sure what this could mean for vehicles crossing this potentially dangerous bulkhead.

As a community, Cape Pogue property owners have been meeting with the Trustees for years to bring the bulkhead up to satisfactory condition. We have been told the Trustees are working on this but after at least 10 years no improvements have been made.

My wife and I want to see an approved beach management plan in place with vehicle limitations to protect the area. By no means do we want to take way peoples access to Cape Pogue including over sand vehicles, however, we find we are all at the mercy of the Trustees. It's clear that money the Trustees has earned from Cape Pogue and other Vineyard properties are not being invested back in the properties but diverted elsewhere leaving us with an overburdened and unsafe infrastructure.

I wonder if the Dyke Bridge should be closed to all but essential vehicles until the safety and remediation of the bulkhead can be evaluated and performed. My concern is too many vehicles could rapidly deteriorate the bulkhead cutting access off to this beautiful but fragile ecosystem.


