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Affordable Housing: Submitted by Shanette Deleon:

The Affordable Housing Committee held one meeting in the month of September.

At the September 19th, 2023 meeting the Committee approved to send a support letter to Community Preservation Committee (CPC) on behalf of Island Housing Trust (IHT) three Island-Wide housing projects. The Committee being on a dire mission to solve the affordable housing crisis approved three applications to Community Preservation Commission (CPC) for three different projects. These projects are Meshacket Commons, Edgartown Housing Heroes, and the Chappaquiddick (Chappy) lot. It was determined by the Committee in order to be more efficient and effective there must be readily available funds, so will proceed to formulate the following four points into a warrant article.

- (1) To raise the Short Term Rental (STR) tax from 4% to 6%
- (2) To impose a community impact fee of 3%
- (3) To establish a special purpose Affordable Housing account to be funded by STR tax revenue
- (4) To see if the Town will allocate 33 1/3% of short term rental (STR) tax revenue to a special purpose affordable housing account

On September 21, 2023 the Edgartown Affordable Housing Committee sent out the support letter of IHT applications for CPC funding 3 Island-Wide Housing Projects. Also, submitted the Committee 3 CPC applications.

On September 27, 2023, the Affordable Housing Manager updated the Edgartown Affordable Housing website and added the Edgartown Housing Heroes letter.

We were grateful to host MV Hospital CEO Denise Schepici for an information session that included a helpful Q & A.

We're proud to fill the walls of the Anchors every month with a different artist's work, and in September we showcased Rick Lee's paintings. Our creative offerings also included an oil pastel class taught by the ECOA's own Meris Keating.

Energy Committee: Submitted by Alan Strahler:

- On September 8, Committee Chair Alan Strahler met as the Edgartown representative with representatives of the MVC, Oak Bluffs Energy Committee, Tisbury Energy Committee, and the Island Institute to begin the federal Energy Transitions Initiative Partnership Project (ETIPP) expert study of resilience pathways for the three down-island water departments.
- Alan attended a meeting of the Cape Light Compact Board as the Edgartown representative on September 13.
- The Energy Committee met on September 20 for its regular monthly meeting. Reports and discussions included news of electrification studies underway, including the Energy Conservation Measures (ECMs) contract for School, other building studies to start soon, Expert Match application for the Highway Department campus is accepted. Other projet updates included (1) ETIPP grant application for water department resilience; (2) School HVAC study report; (3) Landscaper



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electrification including leaf blowers; (4) revision of Energy Actions Report; (5) Green Community Designation Grant spending; (6) EV chargers, funds remaining; (7) town solar fields; (8) Outreach by Facebook posts; and (9) status of solar project for Meshacket landfill.

- On September 26, Alan Strahler and Committee Member Ellen Price attended a meeting of the Edgartown Climate Committee as liaisons from the Energy Committee.

September 2023 saw license holders participating in a variety of fisheries during the month. As the waters of Edgartown stayed warm, and weather remained stable, the most popular fishery during September was recreational quahogging. During the month of September, the primary shellfish species harvested commercially were quahogs and steamer clams. A handful of commercial fishermen harvested by hand raking or plunging in areas open to commercial shell fishing.

Recreational fishing for shellfish species including steamer clams, quahogs, and oysters, took place in all Edgartown bodies of water open to fishing. Participation in recreational shell fishing saw a slight decrease as the summer season came to an end.
